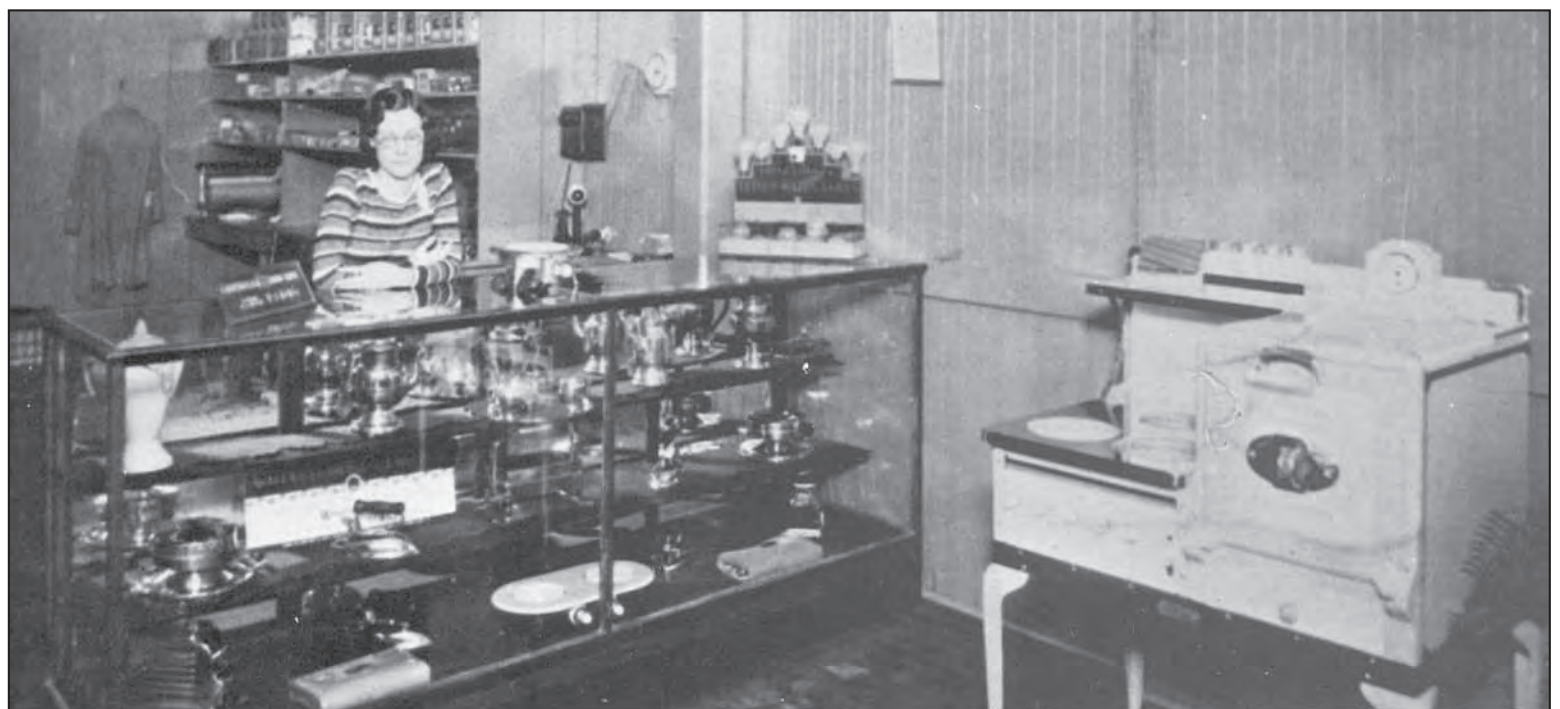
“Grocery Store”

Built ca. 1882

Joseph Ake owned this lot in 1877. By 1881, his building was gone, and D. C. Fanning owned the property. The current building appears to date from 1882. Fanning operated a grocery store, and in 1885 shared space with a bank. In 1886, Fanning sold the store to R. P. Linscott, who stayed for seven years. Linscott sold the building to H. H. Hauff, who ran the grocery until 1899. In 1896, a cobbler (shoemaker) shared the building. In 1902, a harness saddlery and printing office were here. By 1909, it was a drugstore and barber shop. In 1916, it was gentleman’s furnishings. After so many incarnations, this building has had two long-term tenants: Texas Power and Light from 1929 to 1969 and Bo-Kay Florist, which started in 1966 further up Main Street, for about 30 years starting in 1969. Underneath this later stone façade stand walls from the earliest days of this building’s history.
