## 201 Supporters of Save the Round Rock Old Chisholm Trail Stagecoach Inn (Petition conducted in 2013)

In a time when we are revamping the historic east side of Round Rock, let's not disregard and forget the west side where The Old Stagecoach Inn (Harris Stagecoach Inn), old post office, bathing beach and the Round Rock stand as strong representatives of the history of our city! The Stage Coach Inn is, without question, Round Rock's "Most Endangered Historic Structure." The City of Round Rock has applied for permit to remove the Old Stagecoach Inn, but there is still time to save this historic building and move it to a new site. Don't ignore our History. Save our past to teach our Future citizens and make the Bathing Beach a "must see" stop for visitors to our lovely city. is scheduled to be removed from it current site (901 Round Rock Ave - Currently the French Quarter Restaurant) to make way for road improvements along RM 620. Road work will begin January 2015. The Round Rock City Council will decide this summer on the future of the Inn. The Inn could either be torn down or moved to a new location.

The Old Stagecoach Inn is included in the City's Historic Overlay Zoning Program and has tremendous historic value to the City of Round Rock. The Old Stagecoach Inn was built c1848-1853 and is reported to be the third oldest structure in the City of Round Rock. The structure is historically significant to the early history of the city and as such should be preserved. Relocating the Old Stagecoach Inn within the Bathing Beach Area has a strong fit with the design concepts for the Bathing Beach Project.

Because of its historic significance, the Old Stagecoach Inn is suitable for many re-purposing options: **Historical education element** - welcome center or small museum: The historic structure offers an opportunity for visitors to see an original Stagecoach Inn and the Inn could also provide a location on the Chisholm Trail Road for obtaining information about historic sites within Old Town and the City of Round Rock; **Arts and Cultural element** - opportunities for a Spring/Summer and Fall/Winter Chautauqua in the Park Site on the hill in front of the Inn; with the inn being used as a Round Rock Arts and Cultural Events Center; **Community Events element** - the inn could be rented out for special events such as weddings, family reunions, community events; **Revitalization along the corridor element** - as a local restaurant to draw individuals into the Bathing Beach Area and Old Town area; **General park element** - a small refreshments store by the beach that sells sodas, chips, hot dogs, ice cream, Italian ices, and Round Rock tourism items and to rent fishing equipment and bait.

I petition the Round Rock City Council to direct the City's Transportation Department, the City's Parks Department, and the City's Planning Department to take actions necessary to re-locate the Old Stagecoach Inn (Harris Stagecoach Inn) from its current location (901 Round Rock Avenue, Suite D) to a new location beside the rock building located up the hill on Chisholm Trail Road as part of the City's Bathing Beach Project.

**ACTIONS REQUIRED**: City Departments need guidance from City Council on their desires to preserve the Old Stagecoach Inn.

- a. The Transportation Department needs to know the City Council wants the Old Stagecoach Inn moved to a new location.
- b. The Parks Department needs to know the City Council wants the Stagecoach Inn included in their Bathing Beach Project. The Parks Department has tentatively identified two possible site locations for the Stagecoach Inn in the Bathing Beach area. The tentative site locations are (1) on Chisholm Trail Road up the hill beside the rock building or (2) on Emanuel Road beside the log cabin which is now inside a fenced-in area.
- c. The Budget Office needs authority from the City Council to fund the relocate the structure.

**BACKGROUND**. The Old Stagecoach Inn (Harris Stagecoach Inn) is, without question, Round Rock's "Most Endangered Historic Structure." The Old Stagecoach Inn is owned by the City of Round Rock and is scheduled to be removed from its current site in the year 2015 to make way for road improvements along RM620 (either through demolition or relocation).

The Old Stagecoach Inn is included in the City's Historic Overlay Zoning Program and has tremendous historic value to the City of Round Rock. The Old Stagecoach Inn was built c1848-1853 and is reported to be the third oldest structure in the City of Round Rock. The structure is historically significant to the early history of the city and as such should be preserved.

The Bathing Beach Project is the optimal re-location site because of its close proximity to the structure's current location. Re-location to the Bathing Beach area will ensure the structure remains within the Old Town location.

The close proximity of the Bathing Beach Area will minimize re-location costs. The City's Historic Preservation Office informally contacted a moving company, who estimated the cost to move the structure would range between \$75,000 and \$125,000. There would be additional costs to connect utilities to the structure at the new location.

Re-locating the Old Stagecoach Inn within the Bathing Beach Area has a strong fit with the design concepts for the Bathing Beach Project. Because of its historic significance, the Old Stagecoach Inn is suitable for many re-purposing options:

**Historical education element**. Site #1 on Chisholm Trail Road is an ideal location for use of the structure as a welcome center or small museum. The historic structure offers an opportunity for visitors to see an original Stagecoach Inn and the Inn could also provide a location on the Chisholm Trail Road for obtaining information about historic sites within Old Town and the City of Round Rock.

**Arts and cultural element**. Site #1 would also create opportunities for a Spring/Summer and Fall/Winter Chautauqua in the Park Site on the hill in front of the Inn; with the inn being used as a Round Rock Arts and Cultural Events Center.

**Community events element**. At Site #1, the inn could be rented out for special events such as weddings, family reunions, community events.

**Revitalization along the corridor element**. At Site #1, the inn could be used as a local restaurant to draw individuals into the Bathing Beach Area and Old Town area.

**General park element**. Site #2, located further back off Chisholm Trail Road, is ideal for a small refreshments store by the beach that sells sodas, chips, hot dogs, ice cream, Italian ices, and Round Rock tourism items and to rent fishing equipment and bait.
