Public Meeting Summary

The City of Round Rock is currently designing a new segment of Old Settlers Boulevard from Red Bud Lane to County Road 110 as part of the Round Rock Transportation Master Plan. This project will extend the east-west corridor and provide greater connectivity to other roadways and destinations in the community.

The City held an open house on January 19, 2020 to share project information and collect input from the community. The open house was available in both in-person and virtual formats to accommodate community members during the COVID-19 pandemic.

All meeting materials and engagement opportunities were available online for those unable or uncomfortable attending an in-person meeting.








Public Meeting Participation

The proposed two-way stop at the intersection of Porano Circle and Old Settlers Boulevard is based projected traffic levels. The City will continue to monitor traffic levels and evaluate the intersection after construction to determine if and when updates to the intersection should be made. The extension is being designed for travel at 45 mph which is consistent with similar roadways. All necessary signage, striping, and signalization will be provided to reinforce the 45 mph speed limit. Our department regularly coordinates with the police department on speeding issues, and residents are encouraged to contact the Williamson County Sheriff or the Round Rock Police Department for concerns with speed enforcement.



We are homeowners in Siena and we were very shocked and upset to learn of this plan to cut our peaceful neighborhood in half with a four lane, high speed, arterial road, to connect Red Bud to CR110.

This proposed road will make it unsafe for the many walkers and joggers living on the northside of west Siena to access the walking trail in the south section of our neighborhood. Having to cross four lanes of traffic will also make the access to the playground on Porano Circle unsafe for the many children living to the south of the proposed road who come to play.

The noise, light, and air pollution from all the trucks and cars will negatively impact our peaceful backyards, living, and sleeping areas of our homes. We see no indication of sound barriers in the proposed plan.

The required right of way for this project is 120 feet which is exactly the width of the green belt and may be less in some areas of the green belt. Therefore, there is no buffer area between the property lines and the road right of way. This could allow accidents on this road to end up in backyards or even crashing into houses, especially at the intersection of Porano Circle. The sidewalks seem very unsafe with no place to go should there be an accident.

We certainly see no use for this road since it does not even connect to 130 and will still cause the back up on CR 110 at 79 for those wanting to get to the toll road. We are not at all convinced that this proposed road will have any positive impact on reducing congestion on 79 because 79 is a more direct east/west route as is University. This road will negatively impact the flow of traffic trying to get on to it from those who currently use Porano Circle to access CR 110. Having a four lane arterial dead into a two lane county road makes no sense and will increase the congestion on CR 110. We all remember how terrible it was to try to cross 79 when there were just stop signs to navigate, only this is in the middle of a neighborhood. And since when are arterial roads built in the middle of established neighborhoods?

We are also concerned about the very real possibility for increased crime in our neighborhood with the ease of access out of the area heading to Red Bud.

This proposed road plan is totally unacceptable because the construction of this road will reduce the property values of all the homes in the west Siena neighborhood, not just the 45+ homes who would have this uninvited mess in their backyard. I tried twice to post a marker on the interactive map for leaving comments about the Old Settlers Extension, but it didn't work either time.

I was attempting to place a marker at what will be the intersection of Porano Circle and Old Settlers.

I'm very concerned about this being the only entrance/exit for the north part of West Siena for safety and traffic reasons (I know emergency vehicles will be able to enter near the park and what is our current closest exit to CR 110, but that's not a solution for residents entering or leaving with an emergency). With it being only a two-way stop, there will likely be a lot of congestion during high traffic hours without a dedicated left turn lane. My guess is more people try to head to 130 than toward 35, so we're all going to get stuck trying to turn left toward CR110. Also, the two-way stop also doesn't allow for safe passage for pedestrians. Separating the north part with this extension leaves us about a mile of sidewalk to use without crossing a 3-4 lane road.


3. "Reduces travel time"

3. "Reduces travel time"


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Additional concerns: This proposed road is next to our only playground and basketball courts. The road would be just feet away from where kids play. Added noise pollution from cars. Lower property value.



The proposed road segments a master planned community, creating a high traffic roadway that children, pets, and adults would need to regularly cross in order to utilize the walking trails, basketball courts, soccer fields, and playgrounds that they can currently access with ease. It would run behind homes that paid a higher premium for their lots because they were told the area behind their homes would remain green space. It is possible that this will affect their property values. The roadway would back directly to a playground on Porano Lane for small children. This is a huge safety concern, especially if there are not plans in place to build and reinforce all fencing with stone to prevent vehicles from crashing into the playground or yards. In addition, children may be crossing this roadway multiple times per day to walk to and from the new elementary school. This is a major safety concern, even with crossing guards. It would impact traffic on that road as well.

Our community was approved to be built with the knowledge of how many homes and individuals would be moving into the area. It was clear at that time that traffic would increase. An increase in roads was obviously going to be needed. Instead of letting the community know that this area was being considered for a future major roadway that would directly lead to the 130 toll, this information was not provided. Houses were sold at higher premiums for the lots backing to that very land. Now their homes may decrease in value if this road is approved. Although I hope this was not always the plan, I do feel that this information should have been provided much sooner while the housing development in that area was still happening so people could make the most educated decisions about the properties they were selecting.

There must be another area that does not segment our master planned community where this type of road can be constructed. I urge you to seek out that area. Do not continue Old Settler's road.

I am disheartened to think that my neighborhood is going to become louder with more traffic. There will be more light pollution from headlights as well as any roadway lights for safety. I do not like the idea of 4 lane, 45 mph roadway so close to homes and a playground, both from safety and noise perspectives. While adding to vehicular mobility, I see it as a major hazard for pedestrians and a limit to outdoor activities. Further, closing Porano Cir off from 110 will be a nuisance for current residents and severely isolate the section of Sienna directly north of the proposed roadway. I'd rather see 122 properly paved and a slight increase in traffic on an already existing roadway, and a trail connection to Old Settlers Park, since the City of Round Rock already bought a big piece of land.

As a resident living in Phase 4 of Madsen Ranch (closest to this proposed Project), I am extremely concerned about the impact this Project would have on several things. #1 Noise Pollution - What will the impact of the noise pollution this project will bring both during, and after construction be? What is being proposed to mitigate noise pollution both during and after construction? #2 Ease of access - How will this project impact ease of access to the Madsen Ranch neighborhood? #3 Safety - There are already cars that speed up and down Old Settler's both day and especially at night. The only thing that slows them down is the end of the road at the current intersection of Old Settler's and Red Bud.
