- I would like to see recycling every week, and trash every other week, as we have far more recycling than actual trash.
- I would like to see the city collect compostable homes. Both Prince Edwards Island and Whistler BC have excellent programs. The latter is easy to do even for a tourist! I would also like the city to collect yard wastes and flattened boxes from homes. Seattle has done this for years. Yes, everyone would need 'awareness', e.g., nagging, but the reduction land fill and the possibility of reuse (compostable and yard waste returned to soil), could help pay for the programs... maybe.

at all times. 4 Offer discounts for retail space for local RR business owners. 5 Reduce some of the HOAs reach. These are our homes and our small piece of land if we want a garden in our front yard or a ADU in our back yard it should not be a problem. 6 Also reduce what HOAs can change in fees. Most HOA fees are more than city fees (how is that okay?).

Better to encourage/coach conflict resolution and better critical thinking as to WHEN appropriate to involve city IF at all. Emphasize responsible stewardship/not wasting tax dollars...we all want lower taxes... so how much does that call out cost? Is it necessary? City will absolutely come if you call, but fewer calls would be better for everyone. Amazing how many fewer calls to animal control in our neighborhood when everyone made aware the shelter is full and request made to resolve loose dog situations ourselves if at all possible. People are stepping up, working harder to get dogs home thru citizen efforts. Which has always been appropriate. But if it is just easier to make a call...well, then "just call the city" becomes the norm. Night court. Some form of legal aid (...completely at arms length from the city's contracted legal attorney services for advice and prosecution.) Long term, even more important that traffic and streets is going to be WATER. This area is booming and only going to accelerate. Securing long term, reliable, quality water supply 30-40 years out and beyond is critical as future projects will take a long time, and be expensive. Solid waste/garbage. WM site with county is expanding but will reach a limit. What next? Will county continue to lead on those services? Land in east of the county for a 2 and possible site being gobbled up... so what is cost projection if we have to haul garbage farther, possibly to another county? Planning: much more mixed priced neighborhoods so starter homes, family homes, and elder friendly small homes all in the same neighborhood. In this housing crunch...inefficient in an economist's terms for so many 70-80 year old's living in

4bedroom homes, when young families with kids cant find affordable 3-4 homes. But asking too much for elderly to "downsize" or "right size" their housing when doing so means they have to give up their community and the social support they value and need more than ever ..to move to a different neighborhood with smaller houses. Need to plan neighborhoods where people can move through life stages and trade housing while staying connected, only blocks away. Or even on the same street! Totally different model than neighborhoods planned by developers...homes over here 300-340, and different neighborhood for 340-400, and yet a different neighborhood if more. Too stratified. That, and high transaction costs Assoc w real estate sales, discourage rightsizing. Fixing that would solve a lot of our housing crunch. Even reducing barriers/fears of code violation enforcement with the "Golden Girls" model of reducing cost of living by sharing housing among seniors especially, would help. Could be addressed in SFR code exemption for people over 55 living as roommates. I could go on, but even articulating this much this is probably a waste of time anyway. I am not impressed by the City. Not at all.

- more strict regulations for neighborhoods/ care & upkeep such as prohibiting cargo trailers, RV's, boats on public streets/neighborhoods. I would like to see rules governing loud cars/exhaust be made stricter to prohibit this in residential areas.
- More water less building. Loud cars. Subdivisions have NO traffic enforcement. Too much traffic. Stop issuing building permits.
- Multi purpose complex is across the street from our neighborhood. Noise / microphone levels are almost always a problem. I have complained to the appropriate entities. The tranquility of my back yard is forever gone. No more noise needed from the park area.
- My family and multi community members are extremely upset by the fact that we have spent 15+ years volunteering and participating to develop and plant trees in Old Settlers Park (and numerous other parks in the area) only to now be kicked off public fields. This is specific to the soccer fields which are public but not allowed for use in Old Settlers. Community members have been kicked off repeatedly when simply trying to play pickup soccer. We are talking about working professionals trying to simply gather with other community members to enjoy kicking a soccer ball around. We simply stopped using Old Settlers Park after we were confronted multiple times and kicked off public fields. I even reached out to Park & Rec and was not responded to or acknowledged after trying to find a solution to use public fields. This has been the most enraging experience - I grew up in Old Settlers Park and helped develop it, sadly now I feel that I am no longer welcome to use it thanks to the privatization mindset of the Park and Rec department which prioritizes for profit leagues over its community.
- My two biggest issues are these. The once beautiful, open recreation, Old Settlers Park has become a travesty compared to its earlier incarnation. What was once beautiful open space for

festivals, kite flying, chili cookoffs and more has become nothing more than a revenue generating massive sports complex. Historic structures were torn down, wildlife displaced, water percolation disturbed, wildflower fields mowed over, and worse. Lights are left on overnight, noise in the neighborhood has become near constant. This park was formerly a near daily destination, now it's something we avoid and are saddened every time we pass by. The "sports tourism" propaganda is deeply misleading. This may bring in more hotels (note the explosion of those!), traffic, and revenue to the city but it's drastically harming the quality of life for residents. Benefitting businesses at the expense of residents is a false economy. The City's funding of Kalahari and its property is a disgrace, and which created more harm to wildlife and watershed. The other major issue is traffic. Uncontrolled rampant growth of course increases traffic, but the lack of truly smart traffic signals makes circumnavigating this city a stressful chore. I always breathe a sigh of relief when leaving the city limits behind the wheel, because I know whichever jurisdiction I'm entering is going to have much, much better traffic flow. Signals that disrupt the smooth flow of a major road to allow a single vehicle crossing that road to proceed almost immediately is folly. Signal timing is non-existent. I've traveled the world and nearly every state in the country, and I have never encountered traffic flow as bad as we suffer here in Round Rock.

- need someone at the city's erosion control dept to look at my property. We live in Forest Creek and my backyard is eroding into the creek behind our house. 2201 Conway Cove. please contact me
- need tornado warning sirens, Bigger, better dog park.
- no more double diamond intersections! time the traffic lights better, esp. on Parmer. Help ease traffic on I-35
- no more non-HOA developments
- On US 79 at I-35 going west - allow those in the 2nd from the right lane to go straight on Sam Bass. Sam Bass has two lanes. MANY cars cross into the right lane when there is a solid line for not changing lanes. This is an accident waiting to happen.
- other options besides I-35/ improve I-35
- Over never regretted moving here 22 yrs. ago. We have everything we need with a 10-15 mile radius. however, traffic during peak hours is getting out of control. Still we do not plan on going anywhere anytime soon.

- Parking downtown needs to be improved.
- Patrol and ticket speeding- out of control since covid
- please communicate when the Lake Creek Trail from RR west park to Centrix Plaza will begin construction. Its been planned for years yet there is no info about it

- Please complete park renovation projects once they're started, and provide updates on the City website. All work has stopped for some reason on the park renovation east and west of Chisholm Trail by the Round Rock, leaving piles of debris and numerous tripping hazards everywhere. Also, sidewalks along Chisholm Trail in the area of the Round Rock would be much appreciated. As it is currently, I have to run or walk in the street and risk being hit by cars speeding through at 35 mph in the 25 mph zone. Until the planned pedestrian overpass is completed in the area of the Round Rock, why not paint a wide crosswalk for pedestrians trying to cross Chisholm Trail? It would make it much safer for pedestrians in this high traffic area, and would be a low cost, short term solution. The Round Rock is the symbol of our great City, and in the past year or two it has not represented our city in the best light. I run in the area frequently and have noticed an increase in litter and garbage all over that area. Frankly, it's becoming an unsightly eyesore! Is this the impression we want visitors to take away when they visit our City's beautiful namesake? It's embarrassing, and I think this historical area of town should be higher on the priority list.
- Please consider allowing accessory dwelling units in certain neighborhoods. Given the lack of affordable housing for seniors and young adults, this would ease some of the burden on families with limited financial means and space. Affordable housing, if you can call it that, is rarely built west of I-35. This will eventually lead to gentrification, just as it did in Austin. This type of segregation is reflected in school ratings, crime, and overall neighborhood appearances. We need to focus on traffic control and enforcement before adding Domain-like retail centers. Our roads cannot handle the current volume of traffic, which is made all the more chaotic by the lack of enforcement.
- please continue to focus on traffic services. Police & fire are great. Please consider implementing a composting program
- Please enforce the downtown noise ordinance.
- please have more bus stops covering the shopping centers
- Please let us keep the small town feel
- please provide city litter pick up services. focusing on public roads and streets that are owned/maintained by the city. There is litter all the time
- Please remember that adults with IDD's and other disabilities live here, too, and provide recreational/social opportunities for them. They do not disappear when they age out of high school, yet it seems that they are invisible to the elected officials and decision makers in Round Rock. They shouldn't have to go to Georgetown, Austin, Lakeway or San Antonio for activities that are plentiful for other adults without disabilities in Round Rock. We can do better!
- Please stop destroying historical and beautiful parts of the city (Hairy Man Road and the general Brushy Creek area) just so cars can get around more easily
- Please support Abbott as he advocates for border control and school choice.
- Please, please, please finish the roadwork happening on 1431/university near Ikea! The traffic is horrendous. This construction has been going on forever and it needs to be finished soon.

- property taxes are too high, love Deepwood recycle center. Also love your adaptive & inclusive recreation program for kids and young adults w/ special needs.

- Put single family homes on Old Chisholm Trail instead of industry. Move industry out of city limits. Make sure neighborhoods will not flood.

- quality & consistency of trash pick up has dropped. what used to be picked up is not now and you lie about that. Code enforcement does not know the law about coming on your property and when you point it out, you get visits more often. Has happened twice in our area. For years I have asked for a crosswalk with handicapped access to our elementary school. You came out & spent thousands of dollars to update handicapped access on sidewalks and did nothing for the school.

- quit paving all the trails. we need natural surface trails also. They are cheaper to build and cheaper to maintain. Look at the trails in Lakeway, they are gorgeous

- really need to do something about traffic on I-35. Excited about new library- we use it frequently
- reduce taxes / house appraisals
- Residents of Enclave subdivision of RR Ranch pay 3x more for water, wastewater and trash services than other RR residents. Use of Deepwood recycling often is frustrating b/c we are not on "city utilities," as if we live in a different city. we pay the same "city taxes" We should pay the same cost for utilities as all other residents.
- residents RR should be able to have free as many garbage cans as needed for the size of their family, including recycle bins, which should be a weekly pickup at no extra cost for how many are filled each week. The city definitely needs more trash trucks. Police force needs to be funded to be doubled. Do not let RR go to crime.

- RR is turning into a concrete jungle with too much retail centered on I-35, but that ship has sailed. To bring balance, it needs more dedicated natural parks, not mowed grass. More shaded areas in existing parks. Soccer programs for those over 11-18 years old. Huge whole in public program there. RR desperately needs connectivity opportunities for pedestrian mobility. Especially crossing I-35. Covered walkways perhaps? Connecting existing greenbelts would be a huge boost. Each subdivision is so isolated nowadays. We need to expand the possibilities and mobility of those NOT in CARS. Kids no long walk, no longer ride bikes. This is really bad for humanity, and RR.
- Round Rock is going to grow but I don't think that it is possible to keep building more roads... you need alternatives like multiuse trails, sidewalks designed as multiuse trails, good street crossings and traffic flow for bikes and pedestrians, and then transit so that people don't HAVE to use their car to go beyond a certain radius (say 2 miles for walking or to reach a lovely nature trail, 10 miles for cycling, and 20 miles by transit). Transit passes should be easy to get in person, even senior passes, right here in Round Rock. Yes, on a cold morning, a rainy day or blistering hot afternoon, people may not bike... but then if you provided shade over these routes, they just might. Again, look at Whistler and Vancouver BC for guidance. Rails to Trails is a non-profit that would love to help. RTT also partners with a number of other bike advocacy groups

- RRPD has always been a big reason I love this city. Please continue to fund and support them. Transient population in low income rentals is driving crime to highest levels ever in this city. Stop building low income housing.
- RRPD is out of control, way too violent, and preys on regular citizens while ignoring the huge increase in crime we've seen in recent years.

- Slow down approvals for more growth of homes and businesses until roads and schools are ready for the growth
- Some turn lanes are too short. (Eastbound Gattis at Doublecreek). Right turn on Northbound A W Grimes at Gattis. Bottleneck/Traffic Backup on Northbound Red Bud at Gattis.
- Speed bumps on residential streets that are used as a thoroughfare. Transit buses need to SLOW DOWN when driving through neighborhoods.
- STOP flooding and flood zone expansion by better controlled and less rapid growth in building. Foster and protect natural green spaces that will provide beautiful and enjoyment and act as barrier against flooding.
- Stop killing all the trees. Round rock is starting to look like any other city in America. We have plenty of restaurants and shops; we need to limit expansion. If we are going to expand, we need more recreational activities , trails and such to keep the city beautiful.
- Stop light going North on Sunrise Rd at Eagles Nest needs a green turn arrow towards the left on Eagles Nest. The light at Mayes and University need the green light to be longer so the traffic does not back up to far on Mayes. Have a Mother's Day and Father's Day Parades in Downtown Round Rock to show appreciation for the family staying together. Have more family oriented activities Downtown and throughout the city. Put out a calendar of events in your website and perhaps on some business's windows.
