





### Historic Preservation Program

- 1953 Texas Historical Commission founded
- 1965 Historic Preservation Act (national enabling legislation)
- 1977 Sam Bass Historical Commission
- 1978 Bathing Beach named "area of historic importance"
- 1979 City Historic preservation ordinance
- 1980-1989 Chisholm Trail Historic District, later designated individual landmarks separately and Chisholm Trail overlay zoning district for compatibility
- 1983 Commercial Historic District established (National Register)



### Republic of Texas Land Grants


- Those who fought in Texas Revolution paid in land (bounty grants)
- Land patent system for claiming headright
- 2 important surveys for Round Rock:
  - Jacob Harrell (Old Town)
  - Wiley Harris (New Town)
  - Died; headright taken up by Washington Anderson

#### Washington Anderson



- Moved to area 1843
- Built log cabin on north side of Brushy Creek near a spring
- Built first mill in area; washed away in flood
- 1855-1859 replaced log cabin with stone house; hired Swedish foreman to train 4 slaves in construction (dormers added 1950s)



### Washington Anderson

- Daughter Chloe married, moved to Austin
- Anderson built house nearby and she'd bring the grandkids for the summer
- Now the family life building at First United Methodist Church
- · Both are Recorded Texas Historical Landmarks (RTHL)s








## Railroad/New Town

- 1876 Anderson sold 150 acres to International & Great Northern RR
- Railroad extended into Williamson Co., stopped ¾ mile short of Round Rock
- Railroad platted blocks and lots in grid with Round Rock Ave. direct to old settlement
- Original settlement came to be called "Old Town" and railroad settlement "New Town"







### Impact of Railroad

- Rail had been delayed by Civil War
- Railroads made more money from land sales than from fares/freight
- Was "end of the line" until 1882
- Georgetown lost several businesses; built spur line by 1878
- By 1878 more hotels than Austin
- Telegraph came with railroad
- Short-lived municipal incorporation

#### **Early New Town Buildings**

- First few commercial buildings were built before railroad service began
- Simple, adaptable vernacular building forms much like the pre-railroad buildings in Old Town
- Many took form of arcaded commercial block:
  - Common walls
  - Load-bearing parts made from nearby stone
  - Arched openings didn't require steel lintels
  - Doors and windows made by local carpenters
  - Interior could be partitioned




## 101, 103 & 105 E. Main St. (1876)

- All one-part arcaded commercial blocks, sometimes plastered
- Façade of 103 has been rebuilt several times
- Openings on 101 were changed but restored in 1990s
- Façade of 105 mostly unaltered


107 S. Mays Street (1878)


Post Office/Masonic Lodge

- Italianate style






## Round Rock Leader Bldg. (1881)

- a.k.a. Morgan Miller Store
- 1-part arcaded commercial block
- Largely unaltered





Carrington Bldg. (1877)

• Second floor destroyed by fire between 1895-96

• Filled-in second floor windows still visible

• Plastered for part of its life, possibly to cover damage




## The Fair (1891)

- 1-part block with arched center entrance and 2 windows (not arcaded)
- Façade modernized with large windows and recessed entrance early-mid 20<sup>th</sup> Century










# Materials Newly Available/Affordable by Railroad

- Lumber yards (standard dimension lumber)
- Manufactured windows/doors in more standard sizes
- Large glass windows
- Sheet/cast metal (roofing, stoves)
- Butler Brick founded 1873 in Austin; opened branch outside Elgin in 1901. (Elgin recently named "Brick Capital of the Southwest" and still has 3 large brick companies)
- Wood and metal decorative parts
- Round Rock White Lime Co. established 1896
- Tin shops were the beginning of plumbing (no citywide water until 1935)




#### Farmers State Bank (1920)

- One-part commercial block
- Brick vault-like appearance
























### **Trinity Lutheran College**

- Built at 1000 E. Main in 1906
- Ceased operations 1929, building became orphanage, then retirement home
- Demolished ca. 1960

#### President's House

- Colonial Revival Style
- Built 1907 for President of Trinity Lutheran College
- Originally on 900 block of Main, moved to 104 S. Georgetown in 1971






#### **Public School**


- First School building was in Old Town, burned 1882
- Second school building was between Old and New Town, burned in 1913
- Third school building (pictured) was built in New Town in 1914 (site of CD Fulkes)
- Blasting for Interstate 35 made it unstable; demolished by 1962

#### E. Main Street


- Pollard Motor Co was on the corner where the library is now. Later became Round Rock Motor Co.
- Nearly burned in 1929, but Volunteer Fire Dept saved nearly all the inventory. In gratitude owner bought first motorized fire truck.
- Building later became library






#### E. Main Street

- 108 and 110 E. Main facades combined
- Arcaded facades replaced with Art Deco-inspired tile work (black and pale yellow)
- Currently painted over


#### 1927 Baylor Bus Crash

- Basketball team was on the way to Austin during rainstorm. Struck by train at Mays St. crossing
- 10 team members killed
- Prompted first significant auto safety legislation, both vehicle and crossing design
- Round Rock got an overpass

#### **Utilities**

- In New Town most collected water in cisterns or bought barrels of spring water from Washington Anderson
- Downtown artesian well at Main and Mays between late 1890s and 1910s
- · Gazebo over well also used as bandstand


#### Utilities

- Mr. Noble built ice storage building behind his pharmacy at 204 E. Main to preserve medication. Ice brought from Austin by train.
- In a few years Henry and Norman Egger ran an ice business there
- In 1925 relocated to 113 W.
   Main (now the Tavern). Later added bottling plant.








- 1938 sewer system





