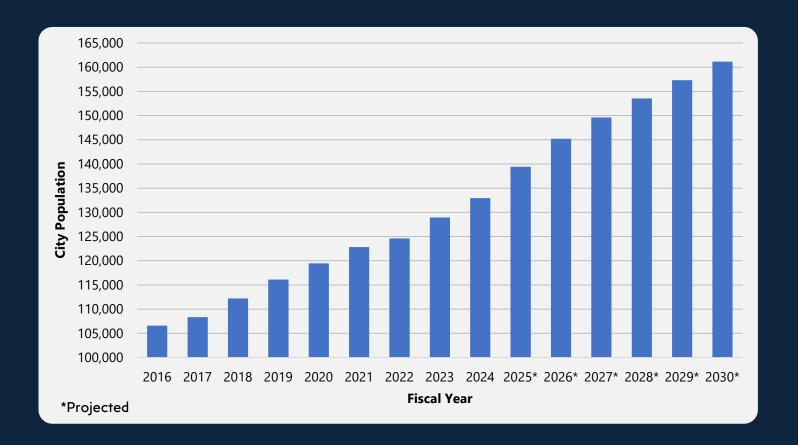

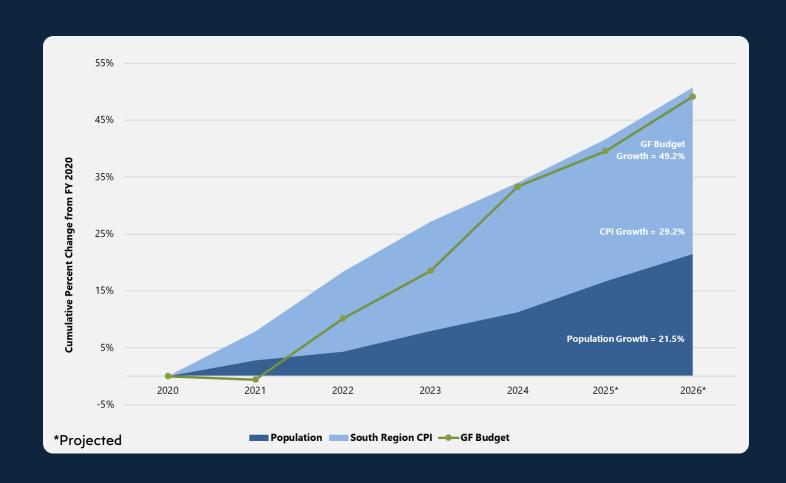

### Inflation & Population vs. GF Growth

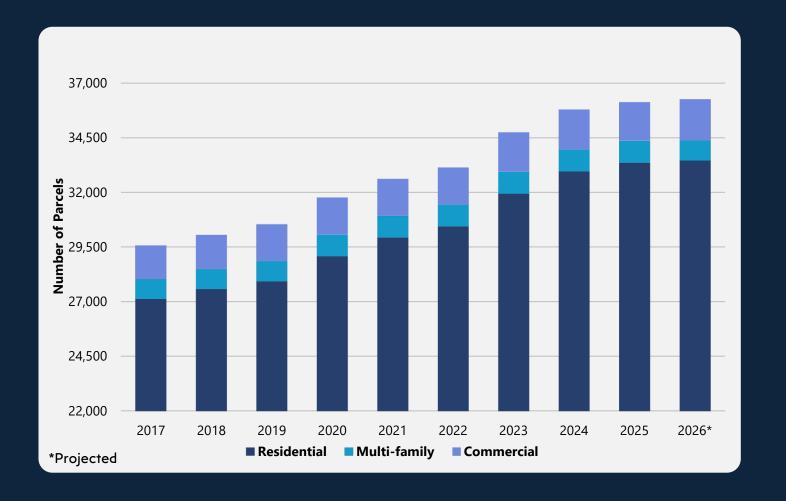

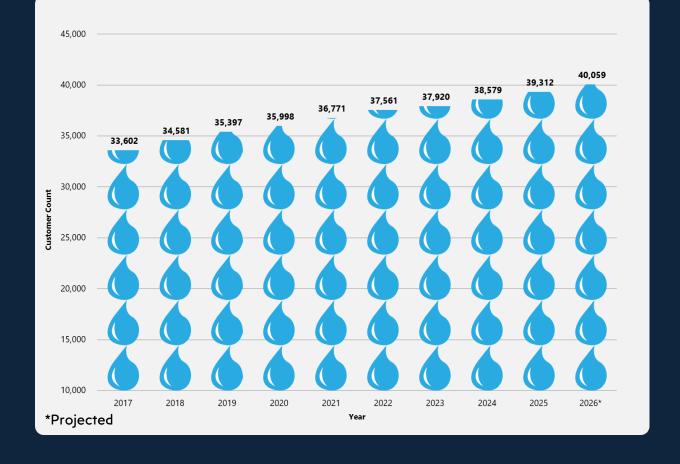

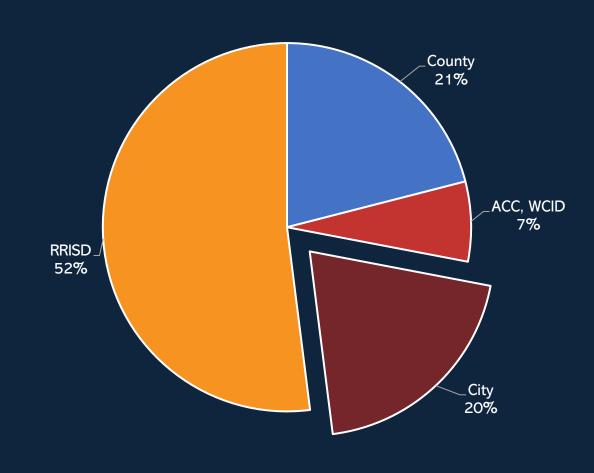


### Truth in Taxation Terminology

- Maintenance and Operations (M&O) Rate part of the tax rate used for day-to-day operation of the City
- Interest and Sinking (I&S) or Debt Rate used exclusively for serving debt
- No New Revenue Rate used to evaluate the taxes for the prior year and the current year
  - Compares the values of the properties on the rolls last year to values of the same properties this
    year
  - The tax rate on those properties that would raise the same revenue as last year
- Voter Approval Rate the maximum tax rate allowed by law without voter approval

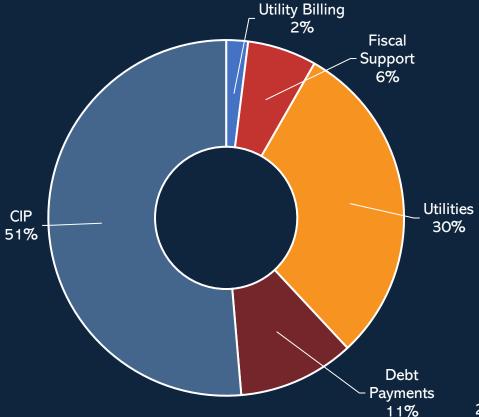


### Utility Fund Revenues & Expenses

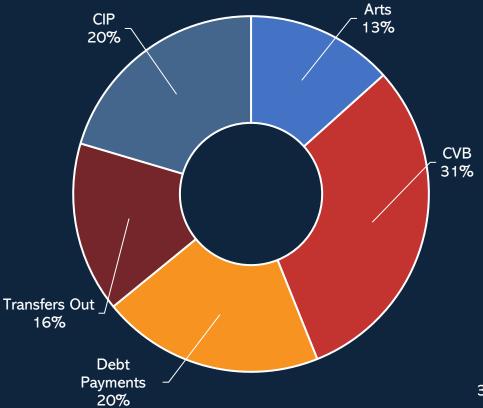


# HOT Fund Revenues & Expenses

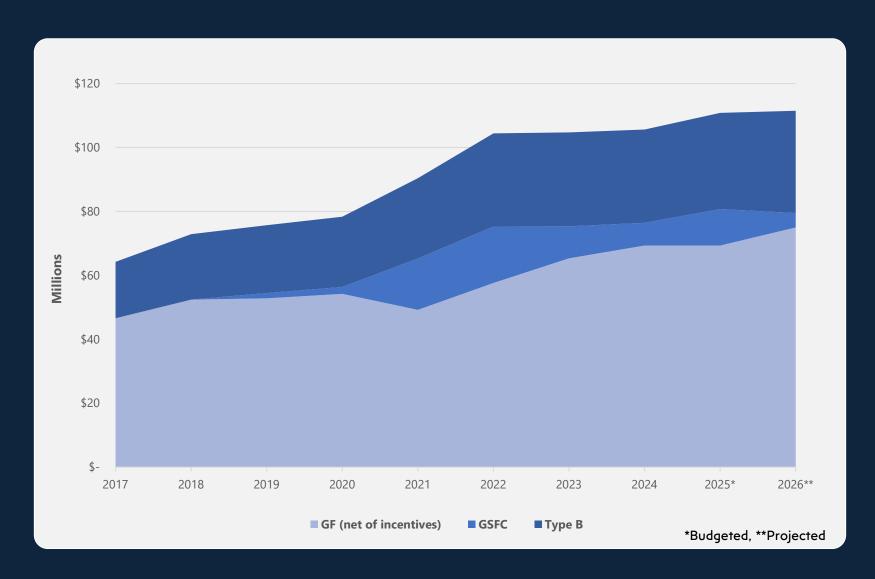


## General Fund Revenues by Source



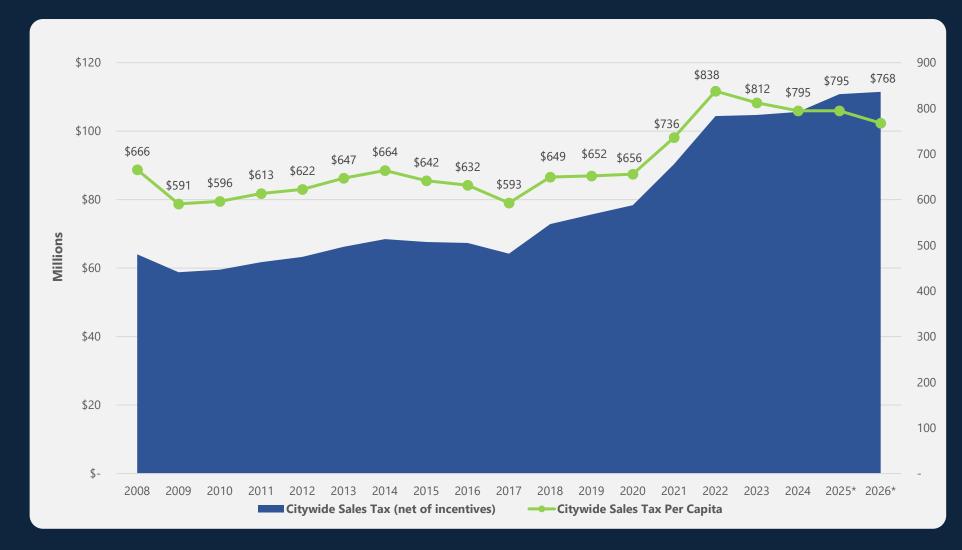

- In partnership with the Play for All Foundation, awarded a \$250,000 grant toward the expansion of the Play for All Park. The Sustainability Pod is expected to be complete and open in early 2026. The replacement of the Dennis' Dream Playground will begin in early 2026 and is expected to be completed by Summer 2026.



## Special Events Update

#### FY 2025 Impacts and 2026 Overview

- Experienced continued cost pressures from price increases and event participation growth
- Diwali Fest was traditionally funded thru Arts & Culture but in 2024, the event support was transferred to PARD. Support for Diwali is primarily equipment rentals for use at the event.
- Rapid growth in Donut Dash and Flavor Fest resulted in additional supply expenses for the additional attendees. The current special events line-item budget can not absorb these additional expenses.
   Both events are fee-based and offset the expense of the additional supplies.
- Event related price increases experienced this year include:
  - Rental and barrier fencing across numerous events
  - Helium for balloons at July 4th Parade and Light Up the Lake
  - Sound & lighting production for Juneteenth, July 4th, and Light Up the Lake
  - Talent/entertainment vendors across numerous events
  - Event supplies across all events



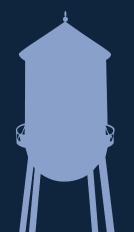

## Planning & Development Services

#### FY 2025 Highlights

- Successfully managed another year of high growth to the tune of a projected \$547 million in new nonresidential and multifamily projects and a projected 975 new single-family and townhome permits
- Collaborated with Public Works on the adoption of revised landscaping requirements for new development to enhance the city's reputation as a water-wise community
- Facilitated the annexation and MUD approval for the Briggs Tract (900+ home subdivision)
- Facilitated the PUD amendment and permitting process for The District.
- Facilitated the construction of Amazon, Switch and Sabey Data Centers, major expansion to Ascension Seton Williamson Hospital, and projects of community interest such as expansions to YMCA, Round Rock Area Serving Center, and ACC

- PDS is working on the following strategic planning goals:
  - Re-evaluation of downtown zoning districts adoption late Summer/early Fall
  - Downtown Vision
  - Non-residential parking standards





### **Police**

#### FY 2025 Highlights

- Worked to bring onto staff ten additional officers to address city growth
- Received a \$347,874 state grant to fund resources to address regional vehiclerelated crimes and begin implementing a Drone-as-First-Responder program
- Upgraded the mobile Sky Watch surveillance towers with new cameras and equipment
- Installed a new evidence refrigerator

- Fully staff out and implement the Special Assignments Unit to address crime and public safety issues on City parks and trails, the downtown district and during special events
- Fully implementation of a \$347,874 state grant providing resources to address regional vehicle-related crimes and begin a Drone-as-First-Responder program
- Full implementation of new Public Safety computer aided dispatch and records management systems





## **Transportation**

- Completed two significant roadway projects: Kenney Fort Segment 2
   & 3 and Kenney Fort Segment 4C
- Commenced construction on Nine Driving Progress projects
- Continued ROW acquisition and utility relocations to support future planned projects

- Implemented Phase 4 of the Roadway Impact Fees
- Improvements to Rock Care parking lot with Internal Crews
- Implemented and installed higher-visibility crosswalks
- Transit Program Completed first year of Citywide Round Rock Rides Mobility on Demand Service and worked with Tesla and Flix (Greyhound) to establish connections at the transit center

- Installed lighting for pedestrians along the trail crossing under Kenney Fort near Kalahari

- Complete installation of higher visibility crosswalks with Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) on Creek Bend Blvd, Greenlawn Blvd, and Main Street
- Continue to construct Shared Use Paths along connect arterials throughout the City
- Commence construction of Bob Bennett Building, Phase 2

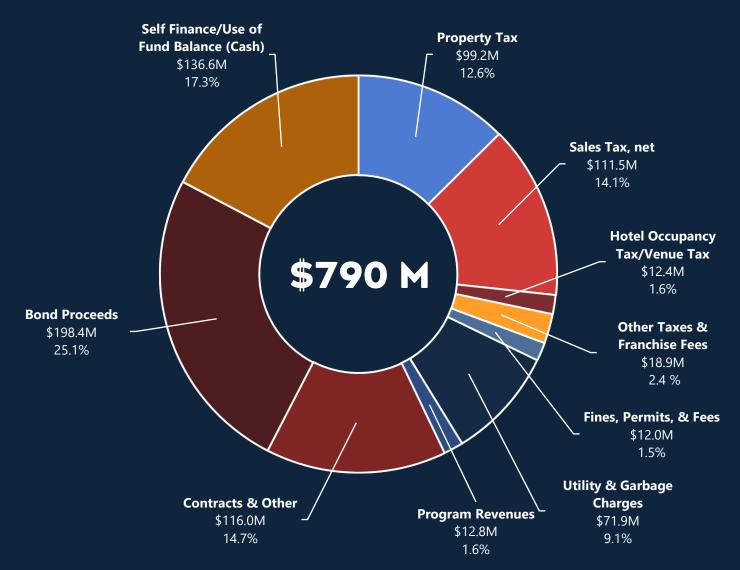

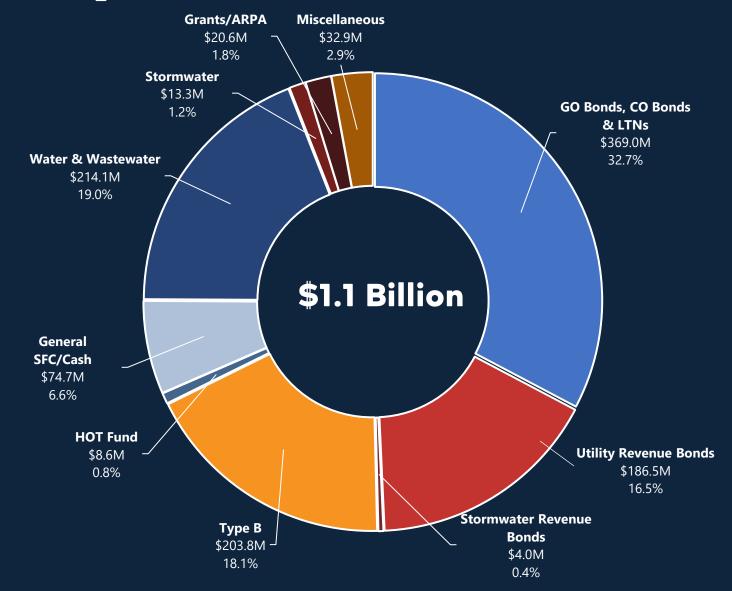


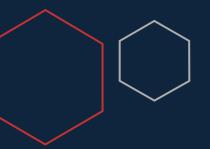
## Five Year CIP by Use

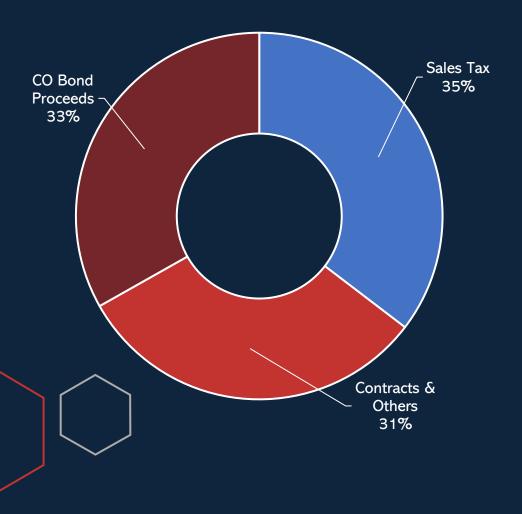

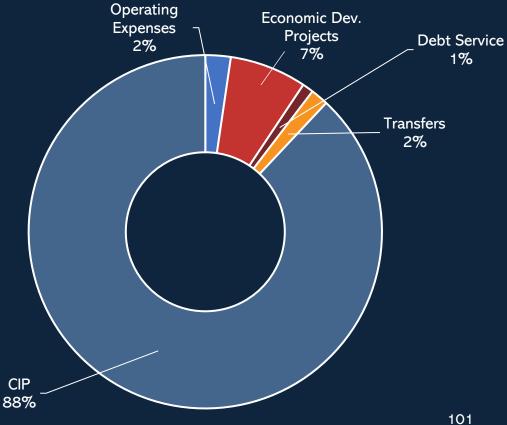


# RRTEDC (Type B)

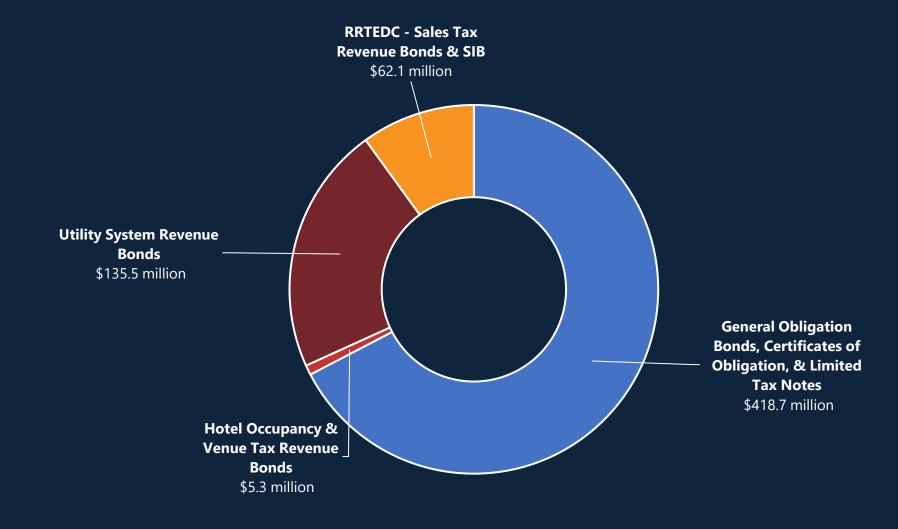

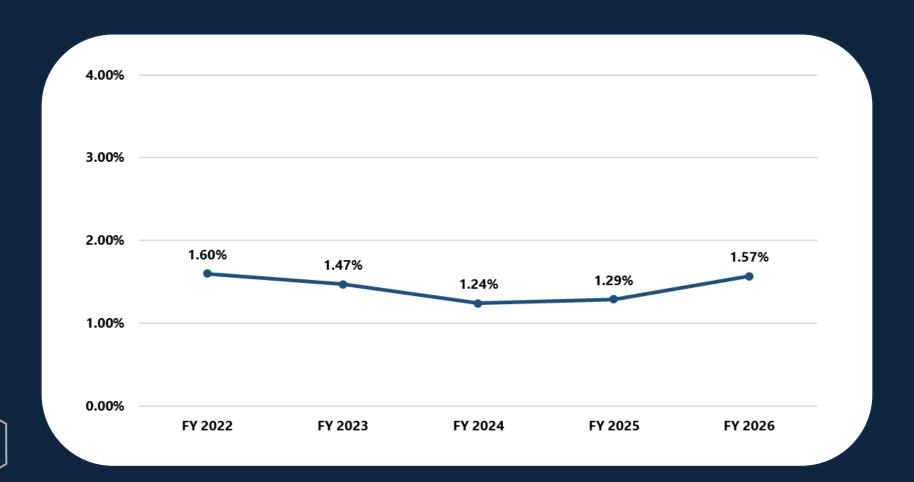

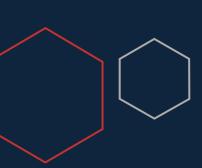
